OIL & WATER & COLORED PENCILS—OH, MY! ~ Melissa Miller Nece, CPSA, CPX



Melissa Miller Nece presented a workshop about using water-soluble oil paint as an underpainting beneath colored pencils. Royal Talens "Cobra" water-soluble oil paints was the brand used. Melissa explained a process of treating watercolor hot-press art board with clear Winsor & Newton gesso before applying the oil paint, with the colored pencil on top of that. We, however, used a shortcut — Stonehenge oil paper. This paper is treated to allow the use of oil paint directly on its surface without the need for gesso. It has quite a texture to it and the use of a painted underlayer was necessary to cover the tooth. Arches also makes a paper for use with oil paint.

We chose from a selection of several source color photos, of both figures and still life. Melissa provided simple line drawings of each photo on the Stonehenge oil paper, and a black and white photo to show the values of the composition. We had a choice of three oil paint colors, burnt sienna, dark green, and red. Melissa squeezed a small amount on palette paper and told us that a little would go a long way.

Melissa also provided a Faber Castell Perfection eraser that resembles an old-fashioned typewriter eraser, with a gritty point at one end and a brush at the other end. She suggested using this to blend colored pencils and to push them into the tooth of the paper. She thinks the eraser works better than a blender.

We spent most of the morning painting the underlayer of the oil paint, in tonal values. The paint resembled a monotone watercolor on the paper. The rest of the day was spent applying colored pencil on top of the underpainting.

It was informative to learn a new method of covering the white tooth of the paper. I was amazed to learn that there is such a thing as water-soluble oil paint. I also was not familiar with the Stonehenge paper that is specially treated to accept oil paint and water. It's always interesting to become acquainted with new products and this workshop was an enjoyable way of doing that.

OUTSIDE TO INSIDE ~ Deborah Maklowski, CPSA, CPX

It isn't about drawing - the very first thing we heard from Deborah as we started our workshop "Plein Air Aesthetic Indoors."

How relaxing and free thinking to start off our day with such an inspiring friend, artist and creative presenter! Our day, under the guidance of Deborah, was relaxing, stimulating, an eye opener as to how to look at our surroundings and approach our artwork in an entirely different mindset - at least for me, uptight, precise, detailed approach to most of my work. What a way to learn to loosen up and sort of let it happen, all the while being free to control and manipulate our artwork.

We were reminded again that we have freedoms with composition, we don't have to include everything that we see. We have the ability to move mountains if we feel the need. Thinking more about the sun and shadows on the buildings and on the ground. For plein air art it's a good idea to make sketches to capture the scene.

We worked on grit paper and quickly drew basic lines of the scene, adding Inktense blocks to the shapes, washed in with a small amount of alcohol applied with a brush to create an undercoating. We were directed to pay attention to values, understanding that hard edges are for objects, using soft edges for blurring where two shapes meet. The underpainting created the foundation of our work.

We then used our colored pencils on top of the underpainting to create an illusion, the impression of sky, grass, shadow and light. We were told to use our pencils as a paint brush - what a concept.

I came away from this workshop with a strong desire to lighten up, relax and let it happen using all the skills and techniques we have learned. It opened my eyes as to the importance of letting go of too much detail as I have found myself doing over the years. I now have found a way to give more variety to my work, to know that I can move back and forth in my approach when I feel I need a change in my compositions.

Thank you Deborah for opening my eyes to change - I need to be reminded over and over about being flexible, about being open to new ideas and new techniques. My creative thoughts have been stimulated and renewed!

On Thursday, November 9 at Noon, Sarah Becktel, will present "**The Essentials of Art Materials**", a 90-minute hands-on presentation that focuses on art materials and the relationship between paper surfaces and drawing/painting media. The presentation will empower artists with the knowledge necessary to choose the right papers and art materials for their own artistic practice. Attendees will participate in hands-on exercises using a selection of papers and drawing materials.

The presentation will cover all aspects of art papers including:

- · How paper is made on different types of papermaking machines
- The technical aspects of paper (weight, sizing, fibers used, and surface texture)
- · How surface texture and sizing affect the look of your artwork
- How to choose the right papers and surfaces for your artistic practice
- · Storing/handling paper and artwork for longevity and permanence


